Back in 2003 I laid the foundations of PMPI. My goal back then was to utilize the technology available to us to help Californians in need get the quality Psychiatric care they deserved. Today, that is still my goal.

Much has changed from back in 2003 when I first founded PMPI; nothing more than the Affordable Care Act which began last year in 2014! The ACA has allowed a renewed focus on Mental Health which is a critical part of the bill. Funding for MH to Medi-Cal and Medi-

Cal HMO's and many grants have been made available to help with the funding of equipment and resources to implement Tele-Psychiatry.

Internally, we are excited about the continued growth of our company. Today we service 23 clinic groups statewide comprising of soon to be from 81 to 93 total clinics.

We have also grown our panel of providers which consist of board certified/board eligible Psychiatrists and Mid Level Psychiatric Nurse Practitioners. To date we have 45 providers on our panel consisting of over 186 years in Tele-Health experience combined.

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
MENTAL HEALTH STIGMA

According to the Huffington Post, An estimated 43.7 million American adults – 18.6 percent of all adults in the U.S. – suffer from a mental illness. But only 13.4 percent of U.S. adults get any mental health treatment at all. Why is this? There is a stigma related to mental health, that's why. There is a "social stigma" which is characterized by

prejudicial attitudes and discriminating behavior directed towards individuals with mental health problems. In California, cultural impact on this stigma is also affecting care. This leads to shame and disgrace on the part of the person with the illness. This typically leads to an increase in morbidity and

mortality rates among those affected by a mental health disorder. Substance Abuse in addition complicates mental and physical health in addition to this. It is time we work together to eliminate the stigma and help those in need.

PMPI is proud to announce an additional partnership with Clinica Sierra Vista (CSV) which initiated beginning 2015. TELE-PSYCHIATRY IN RURAL IDAHO WORKS WELL

"Tele-Psychiatry is a viable tool to create access for underserved populations..."

There's an article in Psychiatric News which discusses how a Rural area of Idaho began utilizing Tele-Psychiatry. St. Mary's Hospital in Idaho County, Idaho, began utilizing Tele-Psychiatry for two reasons...it seen a need and the supply of Psychiatrists was low. There are five Psychiatrists per 100,000 people in Idaho. The nearest adult psychiatrist is an hour away, and the nearest child psychiatrist works three hours away. Hospital President Patrick Branco says "It's a long way to nowhere." He is referring to the fact that Idaho County is at least 500 miles from a major metropolitan area. Like other rural areas, this makes it difficult to provide many kinds of specialized medical care, including Psychiatric care.

Branco says that since implementing Tele-Psychiatry, many of the patients significantly showed lower annual rates of hospitalization, primary care visits, or emergency room visits for any reason compared with baseline.

They also showed that costs for those services for those patients dropped from \$5103 per patient to \$2073 per patient. Pam McBride, Chiefs Grant Officer at St. Mary's Hospital put it best by saying "Tele-Psychiatry is a viable tool to create access for underserved populations, but teamwork is crucial for success."
